The directors present their annual report and the audited financial statements of the company for the financial year ended 31 December 2024.

No remuneration or expenses were paid to any director for their services to the Company.

Principal activities

The company's main objective is to establish and promote entrepreneurship. The focus of support is to encourage and help young people, unemployed persons and others in the community to establish their own business and also to assist existing business enterprises for the benefit of the community as a whole.

The company has a secondary objective to regenerate the local economy with special emphasis on improving the quality of life for the local community, especially disadvantaged and marginalised people living in the area.

Development and performance

In the year we celebrated our 40th anniversary with an event held at our premises with the Lord Mayor of Dublin James Geoghegan, friends and supporters in attendance. Other highlights of the year include:

Enterprise & Employment Impacts

We supported thirty-four businesses with workspace, and they created employment for 84 people. We also provided workspace to 18 remote workers.

We supported thirty-three local businesses with meeting space and our virtual office business service supported a further twenty-seven businesses.

Community Based Impacts

We delivered three Digital & Social programmes to older people aged over 55 totaling twenty-six weeks. This included 373 courses, workshops, activities, and events with over 1150 enrolments on the programmes.

Our meeting spaces were used by 11 local community, voluntary, faith based and sports groups at our special reduced rate.

Community Based Impacts (continued)

We provided 8 unemployed people with work placement opportunities as part the TUS Job Activation Scheme with Dublin South City Partnership.

Internal Improvements

This year we continued our fire safety improvement programme with the addition of new fire doors and emergency lighting.

We secured climate action funding and installed a new bicycle shelter, bicycle repair station and replaced all fluorescent lighting with LED's.

1GB broadband brought to our building.

Financial results, assets and liabilities and financial position

The charity recorded a surplus in the year of €85,652 (2023: deficit -€21,892). At the end of the year the company has assets of €605,002 (2023: €508,497) and liabilities of €242,605 (2023: €231,752). The net assets of the company are €362,397 (2023: €276,745). Of the net funds at 31 December 2024 €0 of this is attributable to restricted funds (2023: €0).

Principal risks and uncertainties

The directors have identified that the key risks and uncertainties the charity faces relate to the risk of reduced state funding in the future and of the potential increase in compliance requirements in accordance with company, health and safety, taxation and other legislation;

The charity mitigates these risks as follows:

- i) The charity continually monitors the level of activity, prepares and monitors its budgets, targets and projections. The charity's strategic plans allow for the continuation of current activities and services.
- ii) The company closely monitors emerging changes to regulations and legislation on an ongoing basis.

Internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, tenants and visitors to the centre.

Likely future developments

The charity plans continuing the activities outlined above in the forthcoming years subject to satisfactory funding arrangements. Other future developments include:

- We will install 102 solar panels on our roof and insulate the entire attic space.
- To increase footfall again to over 18,369 in 2025.
- Provide meeting space for 30 unique businesses and community, voluntary and sports organizations.
- Conduct three needs assessments with businesses, the community and facility users.
- Develop a new strategic plan for the organisation.
- Development of a new large multi-use meeting, training and events space.

Events after the end of the reporting period

There have been no significant events affecting the charity since the year end.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Community Enterprise Society CLG (the 'company') for the financial year ended 31 December 2024 which comprise the profit and loss account, statement of comprehensive income, balance sheet, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 3. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish law and FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland.

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the assets, liabilities and financial position of the company as at 31 December 2024 and of its profit for the financial year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (Ireland) (ISAs (Ireland)) and applicable law. Financial year ended 31 December 2024

1. General information

The company is a private company limited by guarantee, registered in Ireland. The address of the registered office is 17 Rathfarnham Road, Terenure, Dublin 6, D6W X921.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'.

3. Accounting policies and measurement bases

Basis of preparation

The financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis, under the historical cost convention, and comply with the financial reporting standards of the Financial Reporting Council and promulgated by Chartered Accountants Ireland and the Companies Act 2014.

The financial statements are prepared in Euro, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

The continuation of operations is dependent on grants from Public Sector Bodies. The directors believe that funding will continue for the foreseeable future and that the going concern convention is appropriate to the company.

Turnover

Incoming resources have been included in the financial statements only when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Income received by way of grants, donations and gifts is included in full in the financial statements when receivable.
- Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- Incoming resources from charitable trading activity are accounted for when earned.
- Investment income is included when receivable.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred.

Taxation

No charge to current or deferred taxation arises as the charity has been granted charitable status under Sections 207 and 208 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997, Charity No CHY 9960.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and are subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Freehold property	- 2.5%
Plant and machinery	- 20%
Fittings fixtures and equipment	- 20%
Computer equipment	- 25%

If there is an indication that there has been a significant change in depreciation rate, useful life or residual value of tangible assets, the depreciation is revised prospectively to reflect the new estimates.

Impairment

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

4. Limited by guarantee

The company is one limited by guarantee not having a share capital. The liability of each member in the event of the company being wound up is €1.27.

22. Subscriber loans

When the Company was incorporated in 1990, a resolution was passed by the Board requiring the Company to repay €12.70 to each member in respect of each share held in The Community Enterprise Society Limited. These monies were not repaid immediately but were held by the Company as a debt due to each member and repayable without interest on three months' notice.

As its meeting on 11 October 2006, the Board decided to return the loans to subscribers and initiated during that year a process of contacting all subscribers. The results of this exercise in value terms was as follows:

At their meeting on 19 December 2006, the Board proposed that as the loans were in excess of 20 years old, and the individuals couldn't be contacted, that the balances of such loans be transferred into General Reserve and that a provision of €1,000 be made for possible repayment requests in the future. During 2008 and 2010 loans amounts to €734 were paid, thus leaving a provision balance of €266. This increased to €278 in 2012 as a cheque to repay a loan was not presented for payment.
